# PUBLIC HEARING ON LOCAL LAWS WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 25, 1989 3:00 P.M. -- CITY HALL

THE FOURTH BILL BEFORE ME FOR CONSIDERATION TODAY IS
INTRODUCTORY NUMBER 1304 SPONSORED BY COUNCIL MEMBER
McCAFFREY AND CO-SPONSORED BY SEVEN OF HIS COLLEAGUES.

THIS BILL WOULD NAME THE INTERSECTION OF 61st STREET AND ROOSEVELT AVENUE IN QUEENS, RITA BRADY SQUARE.

RITA BRADY WAS BORN IN ASTORIA, QUEENS ON FEBRUARY 19, 1929. SHE RESIDED IN QUEENS HER ENTIRE LIFE, HAVING ATTENDED THE OLD BRYANT HIGH SCHOOL. IN 1974 RITA OBTAINED HER HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY DEGREE.

RITA BRADY SERVED THE WOODSIDE-ELMHURST-MASPETH COMMUNITIES AS FEMALE DISTRICT LEADER ALONG WITH MALE DISTRICT LEADER THOMAS MANTON. RITA ALSO SERVED AS A LEGISLATIVE AIDE TO THEN-COUNCIL MEMBER MANTON.

RITA BRADY WAS THE PRESIDENT OF THE WOODSIDE-ELMHURST DEMOCRATIC CLUB, HELPED ESTABLISH AND SERVED ON THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR WOODSIDE-ON-THE-MOVE, WAS THE PRESIDENT OF WOODYSUN SENIOR CITIZENS HOUSING DEVELOPMENT, SERVED ON THE WOODSIDE COMMUNITY COUNCIL AND WAS A MEMBER OF THE ST. SEBASTIAN'S CATHOLIC WAR VETERANS, LADIES AUXILIARY.

MORE THAN A COMMUNITY ACTIVIST AND ADVOCATE, RITA BRADY WAS AN INTEGRAL PART OF THE LIFE OF THE WOODSIDE COMMUNITY.

IN 1987, RITA RESIGNED HER POSITION AS FEMALE DISTRICT LEADER FOR THE 34TH ASSEMBLY DISTRICT. ON AUGUST 25, 1989 SHE PASSED AWAY AT THE AGE OF 60 AFTER A LONG ILLNESS. RITA IS SURVIVED BY HER FIVE CHILDREN, PETER, KEVIN, THOMAS, VERONICA AND CATHY AND HER TWO GRANDCHILDREN ADAM AND BENJAMIN.

SUBJECT: In relation to a square name, Rita Brady Square, Borough of Queens.

INTENT:
This proposed legislation will name an unnamed intersection at 61st Street and Roosevelt Avenue, Rita Brady Square.

COMMENT: Rita Brady was born on February 19, 1929, in the Astoria section of Queens. She resided in Queens her entire life, having attended the old Bryant High School which is now known as Long Island City High School. In 1974 Rita obtained her high school equivalency degree.

Rita Brady is best known for her involvement in the political world, having served as the Female District Leader with Thomas Manton, who served as the Male District Leader for the Woodside-Elmhurst-Maspeth community. In addition to serving as district leader, Rita also was the Legislative Aid to Council Member Thomas Manton.

Rita Brady was the President of the Woodside-Elmhurst Democratic Club, served on the board of directors for Woodside-On-The-Move, was the President of Sunnywood, served as the Woodside Community Council and was a member of the St. Sebastian's Catholic War Veterans, Ladies Auxiliary.

In 1987, Rita resigned her position as Female District Leader for the 34th Assembly District. On August 25, 1989 she passed away after a long illness. Rita is survived by her five children, Peter, Kevin, Thomas, Veronica and Cathy, and two grandchildren Adam and Benjamin.
